

No other ship in America has spent more time under sail — you can sense she has a canny wisdom of her own. You are part of her legacy now, and you will never be the same.





The Good Luck Ship

Launched in 1871, the *Stephen Taber* epitomizes the classic coasting schooner. Built in an era when highly skilled shipwrights built fine vessels to be aesthetically

beautiful as well as functional, she stands as a proud tribute to American craftsmanship. She is the oldest documented sailing vessel in continuous service in the United States, and is a National Historic Landmark.



The *Stephen Taber* under sail today.


In keeping with history, the *Taber* has no inboard engine, but relies on *Babe*, our trusty yawl boat, to give us a hefty push when ever we need her.

Whether we are charging across the bay with a steady following breeze or just ghosting along with a late-afternoon zephyr, you will thrill to be a part of this extraordinary sailing adventure.

Our Itinerary

Each week from Memorial Day through fall foliage season, we set sail from Rockland Harbor for three to six days of exploring one of the most beautiful and acclaimed cruising grounds on Earth. Your adventure will be spent exploring spruce-fringed islands, gunkholing amongst secluded coves, visiting remote fishing villages, and reaching across the bays that lap the Maine coast. In the tradition of Maine coasting schooners, the *Stephen Taber* determines her course according to the winds and the tide. When the prevailing breezes carry us down east, we head for Stonington and Deer Isle, Mt. Desert Island, or perhaps Sorrento or Isle au Haut. Another day's forecast may offer ideal conditions for a broad reach to Monhegan, summer haven for acclaimed artists, or we may decide to tack past Pemaquid Point for Boothbay Harbor. We have no set itinerary, but dependable winds ensure stops at many a lovely anchorage.

As we breeze along, you'll see lobstermen hauling and setting traps, colonies of harbor and fur seals sunning themselves and cavorting in the water, and the multitude of waterfowl that make Maine their home. And we're always pleased by the appearance of whales and porpoises.

Food Is Our Specialty

As the cook/owner from 1979- 2003, Captain Ellen Barnes made the *Taber* famous for its galley fare, cooking wholesome and tasty New England dishes. Since her son Captain Noah and his wife Jane took over in 2004, they have built on this tradition, adding such touches as hors d'oeuvres featuring artisan cheeses and cured meats. They delight in sourcing food locally: eggs, vegetables, fish, meat and coffee are all bought from local purveyors. Their intention is to offer the most delicious food without losing the hearty flavors people come to Maine to experience. The *Taber's* food has been continuously featured in the media, including Food Network's The Best Of...series and *Rachael's Vacation*, hosted by Rachael Ray, as well as PBS' *Culinary Travels with Dave Eckert*. Hailing from New York City, Jane has years of experience working in the wine business and has brought her passion for wine to Maine. The *Taber* offers multiple special wine cruises each season with tastings led by Jane each night. The *Taber* also serves wine every night on all trips.

All of our meals, including fresh baked bread and pastries, are prepared on the galley's vintage woodstove.



Fresh Salmon

Breakfasts include wild Maine blueberry pancakes, herb scrambled eggs with locally cured bacon, fresh fruit and our famous *Taber* Granola. Lunch, served on deck, usually consists of hearty soups, chowders, fresh rolls and magnificent salads. Dinner might feature

fresh salmon with toasted hazelnut beurre blanc, braised short ribs, or hand rolled tagliatelle with lamb shank ragu. Rounding out all meals are seasonal vegetables from Hope's Edge Farm located in Hope, Maine and herbs from Jane's garden. Desserts include strawberry-rhubarb pie, flourless chocolate cake, panna cotta and tarte Tatin with brandied cream. The highlight of each trip is a traditional all-you-can-eat lobster bake with grilled meats, all cooked over an open fire and served, weather permitting, on a secluded beach.







Our Accommodations

The moment you board the *Stephen Taber*, you'll be aware of the special care and attention we give to both our vessel and our guests. All our cabins are bright and homey, with standing headroom, comfortable beds with crisp sheets, nice pillows, and tartan wool blankets. As is typical with sailboats, cabins are cozy (meaning quite small), but there is room to dress, stow your gear, and get a great night's sleep. **There are no over/under bunk beds on the *Taber*.** You will find that each cabin has its own quirks and charms, but each has the warmth of varnished wood, sinks with running fresh water, electric lights, and reading lights at the head of each bed. Heads and a shower are conveniently located above deck.










What We Do

If you are a seasoned sailor, or want to learn a bit about being one, you are always welcome to help sail the boat. The anchor must be raised; the sails hoisted; lines coiled, made fast, or slacked as we tack up the bay.

Crew members are ready and eager to teach you about sail handling, steering a course, and navigating. Learn the art of tying knots, or how to navigate the fog by listening for sounds emanating from the islands as we pass them. Take a turn at the wheel and feel how this handy vessel responds.

As we sail along, there's always plenty of time for stretching out on the broad deck for a snooze, reading that novel you've been meaning to get to since last year, or chatting with fellow passengers. Bring your camera and binoculars and survey the passing blue-and-green scenery; bring your sketchpad or other handcraft. We always recommend that you bring a journal, too. Even if you've never before kept one, you'll find there's something about sailing along the coast of Maine that makes everyone a little contemplative.

When the day draws to a close, the *Taber* drops anchor in some small harbor or cove where we can explore, jog, or swim. You are welcome to go for a row or sail on our small craft or use one of our stand up paddleboards.

Do bring your instrument if you play one. Noah, your Captain, plays guitar, blues harmonica, and sings, and loves to have company. Even if you're not the sort to join a musical gathering in the galley or on deck, you'll find there's something special about hearing the strains of a folksong in the background as you study the stars or drift to sleep in your cabin.

Above all, the atmosphere on board the *Taber* is relaxed and unstructured. There is no "cruise director" with a long list of scheduled activities. If you're the gregarious type, you'll find plenty of group doings to join. If you prefer spending your time in quieter pursuits, you'll relish the peacefulness of shipboard life.

What to Wear

Bring layers of clothing, so you'll be prepared for both warm and cool temperatures. Sometimes it seems we change layers more often than we change tacks – it all depends on whether or not the sun is behind the sails, whether we're running with the wind or tacking into it, and the time of day. Windbreakers, sweaters, bathing suits, comfortable soft-soled shoes, and casual clothing are the dress of the *Taber*.

Special Seasons

June, September and October are three of the most beautiful months to cruise on the *Stephen Taber*. Nights are cool and wonderful for sleeping under a blanket, and the days are usually clear, bright, and warm. In June, the days are longer, stretching into soft, sun-lit evenings. In late September and early October the hills and islands clad in autumn's palette are a sight you won't soon forget.

Children

Cruises on the *Stephen Taber* are not geared to small children. We request that the minimum age be fourteen.

Smoking

There is no smoking aboard our vessel. You may smoke at the end of the day in the skiff, or during our daily trips ashore.

Fishing

You catch it, and the Captain will cook it! We have gear, but feel free to bring your own.

Reservations

Please call us at 800.999.7352 or write to info@stephentaber.com to check availability. A \$350 deposit is required to save your space. You can call with a credit card or you can mail a check to Captain Noah Barnes PO Box 1050 Rockland, ME 04841.

We urge you to reserve early, as we can only accommodate 22 guests. The balance is due 6 weeks before the posted sail date. If you should have to cancel, your deposit will be refunded less 10% of the full sail cost if we are notified 6 weeks in advance of the trip.

What Does the Cost of the Trip Include?

Everything. The cost includes accommodations for one person and all meals with the exception of dinner on boarding night. There are no additional taxes or fees. Juice is served at breakfast, iced tea or lemonade at lunch and wine with dinner. Beyond that you can bring anything you want to drink and keep it in the passenger ice box. If you have a car, there is a \$20 parking fee per vehicle per trip.


